Some months ago it was suggested to us that we should publish a BA Final Honours thesis which possibly lay within the field of French-Australian studies. Although this could not be done, we remained receptive to the idea of publishing research, recent or in progress, and it is thus that we offer the seminar paper of Helen Frank, candidate for PhD in the French Section of the Department of French and Italian Studies at the University of Melbourne, the first PhD thesis of which in 1948, less than fifty years ago, was that by Erica Wolff on 'Paul Wenz-French-Australian Novelist'.

As a continuation of what promises to be a series of studies of French consuls in Australia, the article of Ivan Barko relays a timely echo of unrealism when Federation was about to become a reality.
